Habitat Home Store Celebrates 20 Years of Service to The Community

Starting in a storefront in downtown Lenoir City, the Loudon County Habitat Home Store has literally grown up over the past 20 years. The small group of

dedicated volunteers who started our affiliate was looking for ways to raise more money to build more houses. They

knew that many other affiliates around the country were doing just that with a Home Store or Restore, where gently used clothing, household goods and/or surplus construction materials could be sold to the general public.

They did their research, saw what other affiliates were doing, and developed their own plan. On Saturday, December 9, 1995 that plan became a reality when they opened the doors for the Grand Opening of our first Home Store. Things went very well until March of 1999 when a whole city block, including our Home Store, burned to the ground. Everything was lost. But thanks to the generosity of the community, the Home Store was able to re-open within a few days at a temporary location in the former First Baptist Church building.

Not to be discouraged by the fire, those same volunteers regrouped, looked at what was available in the community



for another store, and in August 1999, just 5 months from the date

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of the fire, the Home Store was reborn at 303 Simpson Rd E, just off Hwy 321. Although this location seemed to be far from downtown, it was a developing center of commerce with

shopping, restaurants and motels. God put the store in the right place.

Since then, some 16 years later, literally thousands of individuals have donated goods to the store, have volunteered their time to work at the store, or have purchased merchandise from the store. Currently, store sales provide nearly enough funding to build 2 houses per year for low-

income families in our community.

Today, the Home Store continues to flourish, providing gently used clothing, furniture, housewares, appliances, linens, books and much more. Shoppers range from families who really can't afford to shop elsewhere, to bargain hunters, to do-it-yourself crafters who repurpose the treasures they find into decorative household items and gifts.

Over the years hundreds of individuals from the community have spent their volunteer hours at the store running the register, bagging purchases, sorting through donations and "working the floor" at the Home Store.

While the store is run primarily by volunteers, with a few paid staff, it also participates in a job training

program providing employment for seniors who want to learn new skills leading to a more permanent job (see story below).

Habitat Partner families are required to work up to 500 sweat equity hours before purchasing their house. They spend many of these hours on the construction site building their house or other Habitat houses, but they also work a minimum of 20% of their sweatequity hours in the Home Store.

"Everything we do here at the Home Store goes back to the Habitat mission to build simple, decent, affordable houses and end sub-standard housing here in Loudon County," said Sandi Bright-Greene, store manager.

You can drop off donations during business hours: Tuesday-Friday 9-5 and Saturday 8-1. The Home Store is closed Sunday and Monday.

Pick-ups are available for large items such as furniture by calling the store at 865-988-7427 (option 1) to schedule.

Seniors Improve Job Skills At The Home Store

Most days, working alongside volunteers at the Home Store, you will find men and women that are enrolled in a senior skills training program

> administered by the EastTennessee Human Resources Agency (ETHRA). This program assists persons 55 and older with upgrading their job skills. Enrollees are placed in nonprofit host agencies where they are paid to work approximately 20 hours a week.


Faye really enjoys working at the Home Store. "I wish I could be here longer," she said, indicating that her 4-year placement would end next June.

Grand Re-Opening after store remodel - new front, enlarged sales floor, upgraded dressing room, heat and air conditioning added in receiving and sorting areas, new rest room, 17 parking spaces added.

Home Store celebrated 10 years.

2006

Gross sales \$275,000.

2007

Home Store began accepting credit cards.

2010

Store remodeled again in December, re-opening in January with refurbished flooring, new shelving and

more floor space for merchandise.





2012

Sandi Bright-Greene became new Home Store manager.

2013

- Store won state award for Most Efficient ReStore.
- Bill Mallett won state award for ReStore Volunteer of the Year.

2014

Marsha Kowalski won state award for ReStore Volunteer of the Year.
